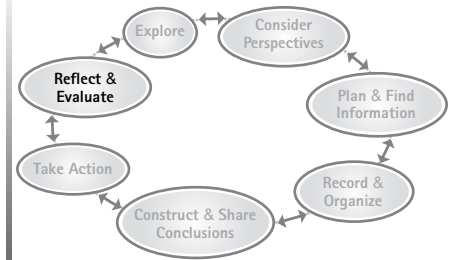
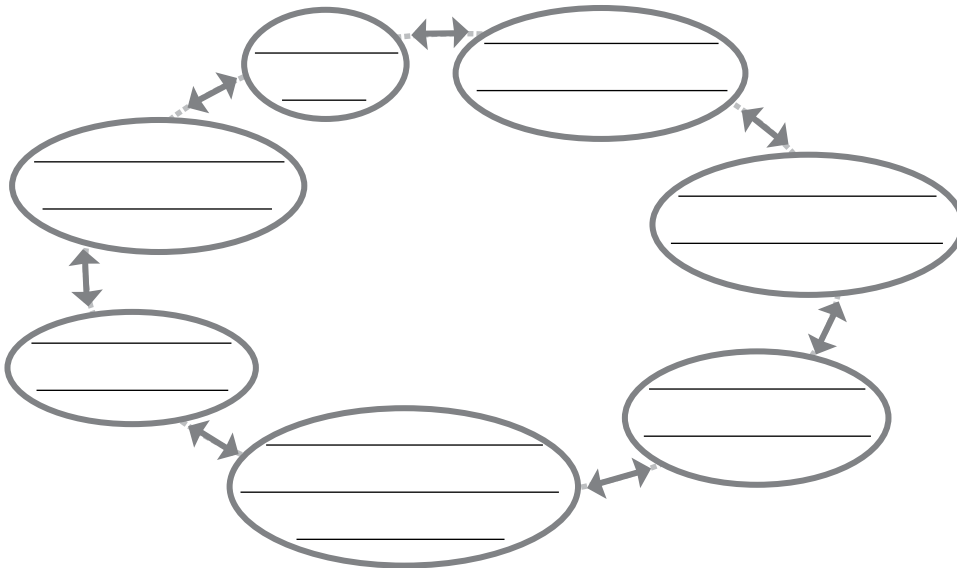


Assess the Impact
